itself, an encouraging feature. Shorthand accounted for almost 46%; Book-keeping and Accountancy for almost 23%; Languages for 13%; and the third year 'General Commercial Course' for 10%.

In these Senior Institutes, as in the Junior, besides the students enrolled in grouped courses there are a large number registered in single subject courses, though they may of course be actually taking more than one subject. The total number of single subject registrations in all the courses in London in 1923-4 was about 25,590. The list of courses and attendances shows a large activity and a very considerable range of opportunities provided. But the preponderance of certain subjects is again very marked. It becomes wearisome to deal too persistently in percentages; a juxtaposition of the actual figures will be sufficiently instructive.
