men usually hold the key positions in an industry and are not laid off as soon as women when work is slack. A further point of contrast between men and women is that whatever overtime there was in this week was almost wholly concentrated among the men workers. Figures showing the per cent of workers on a full time, undertime and overtime basis are as follows :

## EXTENT OF UNDERTIME

The amount of time lost by employees not working the full schedule indicates more specifically the seriousness of the undertime situation. In the week studied, the number of hours of lost time varied from less than one for 5 per cent of the workers to 40 hours or more for 2 per cent. More than two-thirds of the workers lost at least five hours of working time, 43 per cent 10 hours or more.

## EXTENT OF OVERTIME

Only 13 women worked beyond their schedule and none exceeded the 54 hour legal maximum. For eight of these women there were between five and ten hours of overtime work. For men the number of hours of overtime was greater than for women, as was the relative number of workers having overtime. One man had 21 hours of work beyond his schedule; four men had at least 15 hours. The amount of overtime worked by men and women is as follows:
