It was the women rather than the men who worked undertime hours. More than one-half of the women in the full-fashioned hosiery industry and nearly three-fourths in the seamless hosiery industry worked less than their scheduled hours. Undertime was most prevalent for women in the looping department and in the finishing departments where the pairing and packing operations were carried on. The irregularity of work in the finishing departments is unquestionably due
